What did we listen to?

Some early Yugoslavian punk rock.
Paraf with the song Moj zivot je novi val (My life is a new wave)
Pankrti with the song Bandierra Rossa (Red Flag)

And todays show was a year in the making?

Yes. I got this idea last year after you mentioned the story of how D.O.A. got Dezerter's first record released from behind the Iron Curtain and after Professor David Marples played a few punk bands from Eastern Europe.

It just took a year because I didn't have the free time to come for a while. Anyways earlier this month I found a compilation called Bloodstains Across Yugoslavia and it reminded me to do the show.

What can you say about Yugoslavian punk?

Well like the back of the compilation says, when it comes to punk rock Yugoslavia is, I guess was, the no. 1 in all eastern countries.

I'll elaborate. Yugoslavia was different, in fact politicilly isolated, from the rest of communist Europe. From 1964 onwards it had relatively open borders, western tourists and the remittances of citizens in the west were critical to the economy. Even before open borders there was much less censorship, so rock music wasn't banned and suppressed remotely close to how it was in the Eastern Bloc. In fact Lemmy Kilmeister attended a state dinner when he toured the country in 1965 with the Rockin Vickers'.

Additionally the country consisted of six republics and two provinces and they were in competition with each other; so each republic and province had its own record label and they all competed against each other.

When it comes to the punk this meant that the first bands formed in 1976. By 1977 the competing record labels were releasing foreign punk 7", technological advances and the ability to record abroad allowed bands to self-release recordings (especially if they were from regions close to Austria and Italy) and soon enough state labels started releasing domestic punk music. Punks presence was quite pronounced in Slovenia and certain regions of Croatia in the countries northwest, and in the bigger cities.

What can you say about the bands we just played?

Paraf formed in 1976 in Croatia, they are considered the first Yugoslavian punk band.

Pankrti formed in 1977 in Slovenia, and that song is a bit subversive. They faced censors so they

chose to record a record a song the state approved and couldn't bun, but to record in a style it didn't really like, punk.

What did we listen to?

Paraf with Narodna Pjesma (National song). The song has an interesting story, it was produced by Igor Vidmar a journalist, promoter and manager critical in advancing punk in the former Yugoslavia.

It is his favourite songs and he self-translates it as "Our police are the best". He was arrested at a concert in 1981 while it played. It was part of the so-called "nazi punk affair", basically the police found out about two racists trying to record an album and they decided to make it into a show trial to besmirch punk as being fascist. The authorities in Slovenia didn't like the appearance of punks, that punk was getting 80% airplay on student radio and that punks renamed a major square "Johnny Rotten Square". Igor was known to have told these guys to "eff off" and in the hysteria police arrested him for wearing a Dead Kennedy's badge with a crossed out swastika that said "Nazi Punks eff Off".

The other band is Laibach, Igor used to manage them. They're an industrial band still going strong after 36 years, they're known for songs dealing with heavy subject matter like the resurgence of nationalism, the end of European unity, demagoguery and the Warsaw Uprising; but I think they have the spirit of punk. In the 80s they'd get in trouble for challenging the authorities and comparing them to right-wing dictatorships. In recent years they've absorbed a girl band as members and became the first rock group allowed to perform in North Korea with their interpretation of The Sound of Music.

5. Satan Panonski – Iza Zida – 1:50 (13:00)

Iza Zida (Behind the Wall) by Satan Panonski from Crotia. The name stands for the Pannonian Satan and he is probably the closest thing in Yugoslavian Punk to Sid Vicious.

He was more known for his performances and his music. He dressed eccentrically and act erratically, he would encourage the audience to throw beer bottles at him and he would cut himself. He was institutionalized for a murder and during the dying days of Yugoslavia he ended his pacifist politics and went to fight in a civil war, he died in mysterious circumstances in 1992.

Some say he was killed after telling foreign journalists about crimes he'd witnessed or that he bragged that he committed them, others say the mob killed him because days earlier he threatened two mafiosos with a meat cleaver for harassing his cousin. The official story says he slipped on ice and his rifle discharged, but a bullet striking him was a physical impossibility.

- 6. Pekinska Patka Ruzan, Pametan I Mlad 1:54 (14:54)
- 7. Atheist Rap Slaughteru Nietzsche or Sloteru Niče, Srbija ti kliče" 2:33 (17:27)

Pekinska Patka with Ruzan, Pametan I Mlad (Ugly, Smart and Young) form Serbia. The lead singer is now a professor at a college in Ontario.

Atheist Rap with Sloteru Niče, Srbija ti kliče" (Nick Slaughter, Serbia hails you). I learned of this song back in 2013 after watching a Canadian documentary that was similar to Searching for the Sugarman and A Band Called Death. It, Slaughter Nick for President, talks of a Canadian d-list actor who found out that a cheesy character he played on a forgotten detective show from the 90s was a popular character in Serbia and so they made a documentary about it.

- 8. Anti-nowhere league Paint it black, live in Yugoslavia 3:23 (20:50)
- 9. Angelic Upstarts Teenage Warning, Live In Yugoslavia 2:38 (23:18)

Those were two English punk bands that back in the 80s used to regularly tour Yugoslavia. Both of those are live recording from tours.

- 10. Kuzle Ostan idijot -1:46 (25:04)
- 11. Ludilo hardcore 1:45 (26:49)
- 12. Saraceni Daj 2:27 (29:16)

Kuzle from Slovenia with OStan idijot (stay an idiot), in the Slovenian language.

Ludilo from Bosnia with hardcore, which didn't have a strong punk scene.


Saraceni from Macedonia hteo bi da znam (I'd like to know), which didn't have a strong punk scene.

- 13. Goblini Bella Ciao 2:22 (31:48)
- 14. Hladno pivo Firma 2:57 (34:45)
- 15. Zbogom Brusi Li Legenda o Buziju Fajteru 3:28 (38:13)

That was Goblini from Serbia with Bella Ciao with their take on a famous Italian song. Hladno Pivo from Croatia with Firma, the Firm.

Followed by Zbogom Brus Li with Legenda o Buziju Fajteru (the legend of Buzi the fighter).

16. Play a few songs of the vinyl at the end



The Mants, The Brewtals, Ball & Chain and Counterfeit Jeans Friday May 13, 2016 at 9910 Presented by Hot Plains

Have I ever told you that I have NEVER had a bad Friday the 13th? Judging by the line up of Friday May 13th's show at 9910 this will continue at The Mants LP release party. Opening bands were Counterfit Jeans, Ball & Chain as well as a surprise band reunion.

I have never been to 9910 before but I have to say that my first impression was a great one! Below The Common on 109th street and 99the avenue rests the small and beautiful 9910. The staff are wonderful and even opened the doors right at 9pm on the button which is rather...uh...UNcommon.

The first band that played was Counterfeit Jeans and they were great as usual. This was the third time that I had seen them and they seem to be getting tighter and tighter with every show. They remind me a little of the great Chicago band TAR. Musically speaking it sounds as if Jed Gauthier plays with harmonics on his guitar. Even though Counterfeit Jeans one of Edmonton's newer bands (at least to me they are new) their sound, tightness and song-writing make them appear as if they are a veteran band. I have yet to listen to their recorded music but I am pretty sure that once I get to it they won't disappoint me.

The next band on the docket was Ball & Chain who I had never seen or heard before and they didn't disappoint me either. Ted Wright (James T Kirks, Les Tabernacle, The Get Down, etc.) was on rhythm guitar, Kirby Fox (Jongleur, etc.) on lead guitar/vocals and Paul Paetz (I hope that I got his name right) played straight ahead bluesy rock n roll. Suddenly the dance floor actually turned into a dance floor with Ball & Chain getting their groove while the crowd followed their lead.

By the end of **Ball & Chain**'s set **9910** seemed pretty close to capacity with the crowd's demographic being quite wide. I'm 44 and I was nowhere near the oldest person at the show but by the same token I was nowhere near the youngest either. It also seemed that everyone

there at this point knew that the surprise band was a reunion of **The Brewtals**. If I have seen them before I don't remember, regardless it seemed like that most of the crowd was there for **The Brewtals**. They didn't disappoint me or anyone else! Ted of **Ball & Chain** set up and played his heart out (again!) with **The Brewtals** and the crowd ate it all up. I hope that they get back together because it would definitely be nice to see the old **Brewtone** keyboard getting its keys tickled once again!

The highlight for me though was The Mants and their Gwar (albeit toned down version) antics, banter, garage rock glory and their ant heads. Not only that it was The Mants' "Do The Dummy!" LP release party too. I have to say that if you have never seen three grown men dress up in dress pants, dress shirts and ant's heads while playing surf/garage rock then you are missing out! The Mants had great energy and were a riot. By the way, I highly recommend picking up their LP "Do The Dummy!" because it is glorious!

For Friday the 13th supposed to be bad luck I would have to say that the only downer on the evening was seeing so many people leave before The Mants set and that my ritualistic Friday the 13th lottery ticket turning out to be a dud. My lottery ticket was only 6 numbers off! I'm always so close but yet so far! I hope that I get to see all four bands again soon. Not only that I loved 9910's whole vibe and I know that I'll be going to other shows at 9910 sooner rather than later! All things said and done I think that after such a great night I'll be smiling for at least the rest of this month and maybe beyond.

The Casualties Shitshow - One Year Later

You nearly are a woman now and in a couple years, all the rules and boundaries will slowly disappear, wait now my child until you get a little older, every new sunrise brings your heart a little closer- to me But I can't make love to you- because you're fourteen

- The Vandals, Fourteen (2000)

The Casualties' front man, Jorge Herrera, sexually assaulted young women. Some people believe this to be untrue. But it is. This article isn't intended to add to the debate. Rather, it is a reflection on how the events impacted me, roughly one year after the issue initially ignited.

To recap, Jorge Herrera has been accused of sexually assaulting numerous women during the late 1990s and early 2000s. The allegations began to surface in 2013 in a blog post by "Beth" that described in painful detail the assault she experienced at the hands of Herrera as a 16 year-old girl. In July 2015, The Casualties played a private show in Edmonton despite a resounding call for boycott and eventual cancellation of the original show. In doing so, it exposed the failings of a fractured, fragile scene and filled the punk community with vitriol that I had never witnessed before.

All the while, I observed. Online, at shows, at work and in discussions with friends who have experienced the horrors of sexual assault first hand. I observed because sometimes it's important to recognize that, despite how pissed off you might be, your opinions are incredibly uninformed and therefore distracting and essentially a pile of dogshit. I observed because sometimes you need to avoid the urge to shout and instead just shut the *fuck* up and listen.

The more I observed, the more I was challenged to see and hear things through a different set of eyes and ears – those belonging to the more marginalized people in our community – women, members of the

LGBTQ community, ethnic groups, basically anyone outside my own personal "upper middle-class, straight, white male" demographic. And what I found was utterly disturbing.

She likes to call herself a feminist

Misogyny, "bro culture" and sexual alienation are rampant in punk rock¹. They have been since I first became a fan 20 some odd years ago and I had no fucking clue. But to say I was "duped" would be unfair and all too consistent with the lack of personal accountability that is endemic in the punk community. The fact is I didn't care. I didn't care because I didn't understand and I didn't understand because I didn't want to. It wasn't important to me for some reason² and it really detracted from the things that were actually important to me at the time: getting bombed, playing basically just "hanging out".

The personal reflection initiated by the Casualties debacle made me recall and recognize the antagonizing and passive-aggressive sexual banter by countless front men, the accounts of girls being groped in mosh pits and the monopolization of physical space by the drunkest, most belligerent gorillas in the city. The ones marching around yelling "FUCK YA!" or "PLAY A FUCKING SOOOONG!!" with a look on their face that suggested they were either

going to chunder or punch you in the face. Possibly both. For years I awkwardly smirked while observing (and participating in?) these behaviors, dismissing them as though they were somehow acceptable in the context of a punk rock show.

Howdy folks, it's me again, got a message to convey I'm so confused what's to lose, I think I might turn gay

On the day my bitch left she said, stick it up your rear. She never thought she'd hear these words, woo your mustache is so tickly down there



Yes, this happens everywhere. Variations of these issues are present in every facet of our patriarchal society. The point is: I always believed punk rock was supposed to be different. Punk rock was formed from anti-establishment tenets and advocacy for the marginalized; it was supposed to be a community that celebrated diversity and combated oppression through music and activism. But having spent a year seeking an alternate perspective, I've come to realize that deep down, it's not that different after all. It's a serious problem and the longer we refuse to acknowledge it, the longer we will exclude the voices, ideas and influence of a vastly underrepresented group of people.

I am among the very few people on this planet that can say they've learned something positive from The Casualties. I've come to understand the experiences of other people a little better and carried that perspective into my professional, religious and parental life. I've learned more about my own shortcomings, my own fears and insecurities and the role that I play in perpetuating patriarchal values. I've also learned that there is a momentum building towards positive change. There are so many incredible leaders in the community that have taken on the issue using a truly punk rock approach: through awareness, activism and uncompromising

commitment. These are the people that we should support and these are the examples we should be drawing from.

This community belongs to us and we all play an important role in making it accessible, enjoyable and meaningful to everyone. It starts with respect. It's as simple as that.





BEN DISASTER ON PARTICIPATING IN THE EDMONTON PUNK SCENE:

I find there's certain mindsets I can get into sometimes, and all of a sudden I'll picture something – a poster, t-shirt, or pin or whatever and I want to create it.

I don't want to just have a flash in my mind and then just have that be it for me. Which, a lot of it should just be for me, but you know, I try and create it, and I try and put it out there.

I love Edmonton. I'm not from here but anytime I hear someone be like, 'you know, Edmonton is not doing this and not doing that.' I'm like what are you doing to contribute? If you're going to complain about it, everywhere else is the same, they just have someone who is not complaining and doing something. So I wanted to see more wheat pasted posters around and see a more guerrilla approach to shows and take it out of the corporations' hands. Right now with a lot of newer venues there is a lot of corporation involvement. There's a lot of people with money putting that into it, and that's great, it's good to have that there. But there also needs to be that approach, that ground up approach, instead of buying knowledge.

Again, it's great those people want to be involved, I'm grateful for that. But I find it was something I wanted to do – see more graffiti, wheat pasted posters, people doing the smaller things to contribute. I think that's why when I have these visions I put them forward instead of wasting it. What's the point of having that thought if you're not going to do anything with it?

I got involved in the Edmonton punk scene early. We were playing shows and Make Out Videotape were playing shows, and we were on the same kind of circuit doing the same kind of dumb stuff but there was this approach, to me, that by staying in Edmonton you could make something and get it out by touring, now with the internet – if you know how to use that kinda thing – I don't think it really matters where you're from. I shouldn't be speaking for certain people, but I personally feel that maybe people sometimes move to a different city because they think that city is going to make them but it's not. You make the city. If a lot of people didn't move away, this would be more of a central hub. A lot of those cities – Montreal is good, its got cheaper rent, but moving to Vancouver doesn't make sense financially. I do understand it's very isolating here. It's cold. I do think about moving away. Again, I'm not from here but I do have a certain pride that Edmonton is something you can really make it to be. There's not a formula here. It is what you put into it. And so I think that's what bothers me the most when people are like 'I'm just gonna move 'cause that's what will make the difference.'

I don't see it that way.
